Description of the event

The **Comité 21**, created on the occasion of the Rio Conference in 1992 with the aim of disseminating the Agenda 21 to all stakeholders, **is organizing an international symposium at the UNESCO house on May 18th, 2022**, to illustrate the progress made over the past 30 years, and the road ahead in the next 30 years, **Rio+30+30**, in partnership with the Open Diplomacy Institute, and with the support of the French Ministry of Ecological Transition, the French Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs, the National Centre for Scientific Research (CNRS), the French Prospective Society, Stockholm+50 Summit and the French Association for the United Nations.

After the publication of the 6th report of the IPCC, and in an international situation that breaks with the hopes of the 1990s, what hopes can be drawn from the advances and failures of the last thirty years? How to share scientific progress? How to set up new social and economic models taking into account planetary limits? What role for the actors of the transformation? What international governance ensures the protection of the planet? What new rights should be recognized?

15 days before the Stockholm+50 Summit in which the Comité 21 is participating in, Rio+30+30 will bring together high-profile French and international leaders, researchers, philosophers, economists, lawyers, and representatives of civil society who will discuss on the future of global geopolitics of sustainable development during several round tables.

Awareness of threats to the planet and to living beings is finally recent, but everywhere in the world there are very strong tensions between those who fight climate inaction, and those who put the risks on living things into perspective, increasingly isolated.
